




- 4. The first cloth were woven using only the colors black and white, but as time went on, dyes were implemented giving the cloth the vibrance and variety that give it so much narrative power today.
- 5. According to legend, the two men came upon a beautiful spider web design called "Ananse". The spider offer to help teach the men how to wove them deigns once they agree to do a favor for it.
- 6. Each color patterns and shapes woven togther on each kente cloth combine to represent a story and or theme and even symboliz the wearer's clan or specfic set of values.

- 1. Comes from the Ashanti and Ewe people of Ghana and Togo. The origin goes back 400 years, the vibrant colorful weaving of the Kente cloth carry different levels of meaning around the world.
- 2. Wearing a Kente cloth represents not just royal and celebration, but also roots and or overcoming struggle.
- 3. According to legend, the Kente cloth was inspired by two farmers males who encounted a beautiful woven spider web and emulated and presented the technique to their king. From the Bonwire Villiage.

- The two men designs was discovered by a new and first ruler of the Asante kingdom king "Asantehene Osel Tutu" who named the cloths Kente for royal and special occasions. With the two men bringing the skills back to their village 'Bonwire', they became the leading center for the Asantehene and his court
